18th Annual Conference of the Emerging Scholars' Forum

“Diversity in/of/around Canada”

Interdisciplinary Approaches to Canadian Diversity

University of Trier, 16 – 17 September 2021

“Diversity is Canada’s Strength”—the title of Justin Trudeau’s address in London on 26 November 2015[1]—poignantly summarizes many Canadians’ self-image and how Canada presents itself to the world. In a time of increasingly xenophobic, antagonistic and racist tendencies, the idea of diversity seems promising. Generally, diversity has always been a key component of Canadian society, beginning with the culturally diverse Aboriginal peoples, whose history reaches back more than 12,000 years. In the course of European expansion, colonialism and migrations, one could argue that Canada’s population has become ever more heterogeneous. Today, a diversity of religions, ethnicities and identities, the French and English dualism, as well as modern migration phenomena and subsequent diversity management by regional and federal governments invite reflections on societal diversity in Canada—to name only a few aspects.

The concept of diversity remains contested not only as an attempt of describing the social realities of a heterogeneous population, but also as part of political, social, educational, historical and business practices. Thus, the conference “Diversity in/of/around Canada” offers a forum for constructive discussions and networking among emerging scholars. Participants are invited to present their ongoing research on topics related to diversity in Canada and exchange and discuss their ideas with colleagues and interested guests.

We invite advanced master students and doctoral students of all research fields connected to Canadian Studies to submit proposals in English, French, or German. Participants are called upon to propose either a short conference presentation (12 minutes) or a poster based on their master’s thesis or dissertation topic.

Possible subjects include, but are not limited to:

- Diversity in Canadian politics and Canada’s international relations
- Relations of identity and diversity in Canadian society, politics or history
- Historical dimensions and developments of diversity in Canada
- Anthropological perspectives on diversity in Canada
- (Translations of) diversity in Canadian literature, film and other arts
- Diversity in Canadian (cultural) geography
- The relevance of diversity conceptions for Canadian Indigenous Studies
- (Handling) diversity of language and communication in Canada

Please submit your proposals, either an abstract for your conference presentation (max. 250 words) or a description of your planned poster presentation (max. 150 words), as a PDF. Please include a short CV (max. one page). Successful proposals must be clearly relevant to both the conference topic as well as Canadian Studies. Papers and posters should be suited for an interdisciplinary audience. They may present works in progress or published research results.

The New Polis in collaboration with the Journal for Cultural and Religious Theory (part of The Whitestone Foundation of publications) announces a webinar-based online conference in April 2021. The conference is entitled “Decoloniality And Disintegration Of Western Cognitive Empire – Rethinking Sovereignty And Territoriality In The 21st Century.”

The tentative dates for the conference are April 14-15, though these may change depending on the number of participants and the structuring of the program.

We welcome proposals for presentations of all types that can be introduced effectively through Zoom videoconferencing as well as more formal academic papers which, depending on the nature and quality of submissions, may be prepared for later publication. All presentations, however, will be recorded and made available eventually online in both video and written transcript form.

It should be noted that we are keen to have participants from all backgrounds, especially indigenous communities, represented and having a significant voice in the conference.

The leadoff speaker for the conference will be the distinguished scholar Walter Mignolo, Professor Emeritus of Humanities at Duke University. Prof. Mignolo will be presenting in his primary capacity as the annual Kirk Lecturer of the Department of Religious Studies at the University of Denver. The Kirk Lecture, like the conference, is free and open to the public.

Radical Possibilities: Protest, Crisis and Reshaping North American Democracies

Online conference, July 1-2, 2021 (July 1, 6-10pm CET, July 2, noon-8pm CET)
Graduate School of North American Studies, John F. Kennedy Institute for North American Studies, Freie Universität Berlin

The past four years have seen repeated claims of “unprecedented times” in the United States and in North America generally.

Widespread protests over the police killings of George Floyd and Breonna Taylor, growing far-right extremism, attacks on the institutions of democracy itself, and, of course, a pandemic have exposed and deepened societal divides. Yet, as every crisis, it has also revealed the desire of the greater public to participate in, and even radically alter the shape of political processes. The massive waves of social protests, the upswing in politically engaged art, and the intense debates that have dominated the media show that these divides have been taken up by the collective consciousness. Rather than deepening the divide, could this crisis offer radical possibilities?

While the election of Joe Biden and the premiership of Justin Trudeau might seem to foreclose the necessity of transformation in favor of reform, we are interested in exploring potential futures which go beyond a liberal common sense. From large-scale transnational activism for racial justice to smaller, community-based projects such as urban agriculture movements, possibilities for transformation seem to arise at all levels of North American society. How does crisis fuel these transformations? Is protest a necessary tool to apply pressure to stagnant institutions? How can the concept of democracy be adapted, or even reshaped, to account for the radical potential of these social movements? How can alternative visions be created through cultural and aesthetic practices and what is their relationship to social change?

This conference explores the radical possibilities and choices with which North American democracies are faced. We invite contributions across disciplines from graduate students, post-docs, academics, or activists relating, but not limited to, the following topics:

- Hope, optimism, and political imagination
- Anti-racism, abolition, reparations, and decolonial futures
- Environmental justice and ecologies
- Settler colonialism and Indigenous rights
- Community organizing and local change
- Queer futures and the politics of gender
- Citizenship rights, voter suppression and accessing democracy
- The future of medicare and the possibility of health system reform
- Technoscapes and the role of digital media in protest
- Populist rhetoric, conspiracy theories, and right-wing radicalization
- Writing the crisis and alternative subjectivities in literature
- Poetry as protest and politically engaged art
- Wealth inequality, unemployment, and alternative economies
- New epistemologies and methodologies
- The commodification of crisis

In the Wake of Red Power Movements. New Perspectives on Indigenous Intellectual and Narrative Traditions

Institute of Advanced Study, University of Warwick, May 14/15, 2021
Convened by Dr. Doro Wiese, IAS, University of Warwick

Keynote speakers: Dr. Mishuana Goeman Professor of Gender Studies and American Indian Studies, UCLA Dr. Robert Warrior Distinguished Professor of American Literature & Culture, University of Kansas

This symposium explores North American Indigenous intellectual and narrative traditions that were recovered, reclaimed, or (re-)invented in the wake of Red Power movements that emerged in the 1960s in the settler colonial societies of Canada and the USA. It asks: which new perspectives and visions have been developed over the last 50 years within Indigenous studies and related fields when looking at Indigenous land and land rights, Indigenous political and social sovereignty, extractivism and environmental destruction, oppressive sex/gender systems, and for describing the repercussions of settler colonialism in North America, especially in narrative representations?

The symposium is guided by the idea that North American Indigenous intellectual and narrative traditions developed and recovered since the 1960s offer new and reclaimed ways of being, organizing, and thinking in the face of destruction, dispossession, and oppression; Indigenous ways of writing and righting are connected to ongoing social struggles for land rights, access to clean water, and intellectual and socio-political sovereignty; they are, as Maile Arvin, Eve Tuck, and Angie Morrill (2013) have pointed out, “a gift” from which most academic disciplines can benefit greatly.

In the face of ongoing exploitations of Indigenous knowledges and resources, it is paramount that researchers who focus on Indigenous intellectual and narrative traditions, especially those who come from settler-colonial backgrounds, carefully examine their implications in settler-colonial ways of dispossession. It is in this context that the symposium encourages self-reflectivity and invites participants from all positionalities to include reflections on how to act, think, and write in a non-appropriative manner about the intellectual achievements of Indigenous academics, activists, artists from North America. What kind of challenges does an engagement with Indigenous intellectual and narrative achievements from North America pose, and how do these achievements enable their audience to think differently and to develop visions that go beyond settler colonial hegemonies that make themselves felt in customs, laws, property-relations, or gender roles?

Possible topics include:

- North American Indigenous intellectual and narrative traditions that emerged or were rediscovered over the last 50 years;
- Indigenous representations of land and water, community-building, the other-than-human world;
- connections and frictions among and within different Indigenous traditions and/or settler societies in North America;
- Indigenous understandings of sex/gender;
- methodologies for reading across ethnic divides, alliance-building tools in academia and activism.

UCL Americas Research Network Conference Histories of Inequality

Organized by: University College London (UCL), London/UK 1 June 2021 (Online)

The UCL Americas Research Network is delighted to present its sixth annual conference: Histories of Inequality, to be held virtually on 1 June 2021. Join an interdisciplinary group of scholars to debate and discuss the historical antecedents of our era's entrenched injustices and inequities. We are also excited to announce that Professor Gareth Davies (UCL) will deliver a keynote lecture on the racial politics of US disaster relief.

The conference organizers welcome submissions that detail any facet of the history of inequality, broadly conceived, in the United States, Canada, Latin America, and the Caribbean. Papers of an interdisciplinary nature are especially welcome, and we invite current postgraduate students and early career researchers alike to apply. We particularly encourage participants to consider the structural injustices that defined and continue to define the overlapping crises of 2020/21, including glaring health disparities, systemic racial inequality, growing economic stratification, and environmental degradation. Topics might include (but are not limited to):

- The social, political, and intellectual history of Neoliberalism.
- The idea of inequality and how it has informed political thinking across the ideological spectrum.
- Historiographies of political economy, global capitalism, and inequality.
- The hemispheric dimensions of imperialism and capitalism, and how this structures the relationship between the global north and global south.
- Histories of racial, class, and gendered inequities, and the political movements to overturn them.

We will consider both individual paper proposals and three-person panels. Please include the following information in all submissions: session type, paper title(s), session title (only applicable for panel proposals), an abstract of no more than 250 words for individual paper proposals and no more than 500 words for panel submissions, names of participants and their institutional affiliations

Les pratiques artistiques environnementales autochtones comme réponses à la pollution: recherches comparatives entre les Amériques et l'Océanie

Université de Bretagne Occidentale – 4-5 novembre 2021

Organisée par Estelle Castro-Koshy, Senior Researcher, James Cook University Géraldine Le Roux, MCF, UBO, James Cook University Jean-Marc Serme, MCF Études étatsuniennes, IdA-Brest et HCTI, UBO

A travers l'analyse des pratiques artistiques autochtones ou d'artistes travaillant en étroite collaboration avec des communautés autochtones, ce colloque vise d'une part à déterminer les modalités selon lesquelles les sociétés autochtones perçoivent et interagissent avec la pollution et les substances toxiques qui affectent leurs territoires et lieux de vie. Il s'agit d'autre part d'examiner comment des réflexions sur les déchets et leur recyclage éclairent les discours sur la souveraineté autochtone, et comment la notion de souveraineté telle qu'elle est comprise, vécue et définie par les autochtones nourrit et influence des pratiques artistiques qui réagissent aux défis environnementaux contemporains.

Les sciences humaines et sociales s'intéressent de plus en plus au « déchet », également défini comme « discarded », « rebut », « reste » (Joulian, Tastevin & Furniss, 2016), informant de ce que disent nos poubelles (Rathje & Murphy, 1992) et rendant compte des processus de recyclage, qu'ils soient faits par le biais d'indépendants (Duclos, 2015), d'artistes (Laviolette, 2006) ou institutionnalisés voire industrialisés. Le recyclage des métaux et résidus toxiques et nucléaires commence également à être traité (Garcier, 2014).

Cette manifestation se propose d'être une plateforme pour articuler pollution, recyclage, art et souveraineté autochtone, en particulier dans le rapport qu'entretiennent les communautés et les artistes avec l'océan et l'eau en général. Les auteurs pourront aborder ces thèmes à partir des axes et questionnements suivants.

Appel de textes pour Bulletin d'histoire politique L'histoire des droits de la personne au Québec : état des lieux et perspectives de recherche (XIXe et XXe siècles)

L'adoption de la Charte des droits et libertés de la personne du Québec (1975) et de la Charte canadienne des droits et libertés (1982) atteste d'une lente transformation des frontières du champ politique dans les sociétés québécoise et canadienne. En fait, depuis l'adoption de la Déclaration universelle des droits de l'homme par l'Organisation des Nations unies en 1948, la référence à l'idéal juridico-politique des droits de la personne a acquis une telle importance dans l'organisation de la vie collective que plusieurs évoquent une « révolution des droits » qui aurait transformé les démocraties libérales au XXe siècle.

Alors que les enjeux relatifs aux multiples formes de la discrimination et de l'exclusion sont toujours au cœur de l'actualité, l'équipe du Bulletin d'histoire politique considère que le moment est propice pour une réflexion critique sur l'histoire des droits de la personne au cours des deux derniers siècles. Elle invite ainsi les auteurs et autrices à contribuer à un dossier spécial en abordant l'un des thèmes suivants, ou tout autre sujet relevant de la thématique du dossier :

- Luttes contre les discriminations fondées sur la race, la couleur, l'origine, le sexe, l'orientation sexuelle, l'âge, la religion, le handicap, etc.
- Libertés démocratiques et pouvoir de l'État
- Justice criminelle, institutions carcérales et police
- Droits socioéconomiques et capitalisme

- Droit international et relations internationales

Aging Studies and Ecocriticism: Growing Old amid Climate Change

In recent decades, the humanities have witnessed the development of two interdisciplinary fields that tackle challenges for present and future generations: by exploring cultural representations of crisis and change, Aging Studies and Ecocriticism address the complex dynamics of individual and collective agency, oppression and dependency, care and conviviality, vulnerability and resistance as well as intergenerationality and responsibility. Their emancipatory research agendas challenge hegemonic discourses from the areas of science and medicine. Yet, even though both fields employ overlapping methodologies and theoretical frameworks (e.g., Gender Studies, Postcolonial Studies, or Posthumanism) and scrutinize ‘boundary texts’ in different literary genres (novels such as P. D. James’s *The Children of Men* [1992] and Margaret Atwood’s *Maddaddam Trilogy* [2007–2014], or Lucy Kirkwood’s play *The Children* [2016]) which have been analyzed from ecocritical perspectives as well as from the vantage point of critical Aging Studies, there has been little scholarly interaction between Ecocritical literary studies and Aging Studies to date. With this collection, we aim at facilitating a conversation between Aging Studies and Ecocriticism. We seek papers that will open new interdisciplinary research perspectives. Contributions may discuss, but are by no means limited to, the following areas of inquiry:

- Methodologies: options for dialogue between Aging Studies and Ecocriticism
- Theoretical interfaces with feminism, queer ecology, posthumanism, postcolonialism, anthropocentrism, and others
- Parallel and intersecting readings of specific genres (e.g., cli-fi, utopian and dystopian fiction, plays, poetry, film, satirical works)
- Metaphors and materialities (limits of growth, discourses of crisis and transformation, conceptualizations of selfhood)
- Modes and affect (nostalgia, loss, hope, despair)
- Boundary concepts such as the body, nature, time, space, and place
- Literature about climate, environmental, and intergenerational justice
- Competing temporalities: past vs. futurity, urgency (how much time left?), competing cultural conceptualizations of time (e.g. Western versus indigenous notions)
- Impacts on and specificities of different environments (rural versus urban, land versus water, analog versus digital, and others)
- Entangled forms of co-habitation (intergenerational, cross-species, and across other supposed boundaries of time, space, and culture)
- Risk discourse regarding bodily and/or planetary health (disease, mortality, extinction, possible cures, care and dependency)
- Literary discourse and activism

We are seeking publication in an internationally highly visible book series on interdisciplinary climate change research or interdisciplinary Aging Studies research.

This international, interdisciplinary post-graduate Summer Institute on border and migration public policy in the EU and Canada offers two, week-long programs that each include thirty hours of seminars and six hours of practicum. This interdisciplinary gathering aims to tackle the questions of the global and the local, the ways these two categories intersect and engage in a meaningful exchange in the contemporary world, as well as the tensions that emerge at their crossroads.

In the Anglophone context, the process of colonization constitutes a point of departure to think about the world beyond the local. Both the processes of colonization and decolonization on local and global scale problematize the relationships between communities and cultures. In contemporary multicultural societies, these tensions are difficult to ignore as individuals are

constantly confronted with the liminality of their identities: on the one hand being citizens of the globalized world, while on the other expressing desire to belong to their national and local communities. The recent rise of fundamentalisms and mass movements contesting them, such as Black Lives Matter and Idle No More, demonstrate that these trends are still tangible and persistent in contemporary societies.

Postmodern and postcolonial theories provide conceptual frameworks to describe the contemporary human interstice between the local and the global. In the present world, time and space emerge as compressed. We live fast and enjoy the assets of the global village in our own houses through the connection to the internet and the media. The current COVID-19 pandemic further blurs the boundaries between the local and the global. Remote working, e-learning, as well as relegated online social and cultural activities exacerbate people's alienation from their immediate communities in favor of the virtual globalized realities. At the same time, the coronavirus crisis, quite to the contrary, evokes local responses and actions, providing a sense of community building and solidarity.
